Cadet Airport Reception Plan

- All Cadets arriving at the Louisville Airport will report to the bottom of the escalator where a USACC team member (in OCP uniform) will be located to mark their arrival.
- After check in, the Cadet will proceed to the bus area and board the bus to Ft. Knox. Location of the buses will be immediately behind the podium out in the passenger pickup area. The first bus is scheduled to leave at 1100 to drop off at Ft. Knox. There will be one bus every 30 minutes until 2230.
- Cadets who are driving POVs will be checked in at the barracks (BLDG 5919)
- For departure on 24 FEB, all Cadets will be marked off of the master list as they are boarding the bus in the barracks area. The bus will take the Cadets to the Louisville Airport for them to depart to home station. The first bus will leave Ft. Knox at 0300, and the bus will run every 30 minutes until 1200.
- Cadets who are driving POVs will need to check out with USACC personnel at **BLDG 5919** prior to departure.





In-Processing

- All arriving GCM Participants (Cadre, Cadets) will report to BLDG 5919 upon arrival to Fort Knox for in-processing. (See Slide 6 for BLDG 5919 Location).

- Cadre will proceed directly from Louisville Airport to BLDG 5919. Hours of operation are 1200-1700. For any Cadre arriving after 1700, they will call the after-hours phone number 502-919-5242 to arrange for staff reception at BLDG 5919.

Bus pick up will begin at 1645 and run every 30 minutes until 1845. Busses will run shuttles from Kouma DFAC to Disney Barracks starting at 1745 and will continue every 30 minutes until 1915.


Execution

The Gauntlet is a 1.5mile course that is executed over rolling terrain with nine obstacles along the route. On the command of "GO" Teams will run from the start point to a 12' high wall. Teams will be directed to stay on the left or right lane while negotiating all obstacles. All teams will attempt to go over the wall. Teamwork is necessary to safely complete this obstacle. Teams will then move to the 8' wall and execute similarly to the previous wall. Teams continue to window obstacle that all team members must go through. The following obstacle will be two, 30' long, 30" diameter culverts that all team members must go through. Teams will continue the course to a series of over and under gates. All team members will go over the 4-feet wide 40" high obstacles and under the 4-feet wide 24" obstacles. The next obstacle is a Suspended 23" diameter radial tire obstacle that all team members must go through. Teams continue the course to a second set of 30' long, 30" diameter culverts in a "L Shape" that all team members must go through. The final obstacle, Teams will run back to the start/finish line. Time stops when the last Cadet crosses the finish line with the ammo can. The latter starting teams may pass the earlier starting teams on the course should they catch up to them. Teams will keep left of the rope for out back portions of the run.





Zussman Urban Assault Course



- Buses will arrive at Barracks 0555 and stage on 26th Cavalry Drive
- All Lifts will load 4x buses and transport to Godman Army Airfield
- Cadets will exit buses upon arrival for cold load training
- Lift 2 and Lift 3 will stage in buses until Lift 1 is wheels up
- There will only be 1 Lift in PZ Posture at a time

General Gary M. Brito Commanding General U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command Fort Eustis, Virginia

General Gary M. Brito assumed duties as the 18th Commanding General, United States Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC), on September 8, 2022. He is responsible for building and sustaining a highly trained, disciplined, and fit Army by: acquiring the best people, training the most lethal Soldiers, developing the most professional leaders, guiding the Army's culture, and shaping the future force.



General Gary M. Brito is a native of Hyannis, Massachusetts,

commissioned as an Infantry Officer through Penn State University, and entered active duty in March 1987. He is a graduate of the Infantry Officer Basic and Advanced courses, Airborne and Ranger Schools, Combined Arms Staff Services School, Command and General Staff Officers Course, and Senior Service College at the Joint Advanced Warfighting School (JAWS), Norfolk, Virginia. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Community Studies from Penn State University, a master's degree in Human Resource Management from Troy State University, and a second master's degree in Joint Strategy and Campaign Planning from the Joint Advanced Warfighting School. He is also a graduate of the MIT Seminar XXI Program.

General Brito has served in a variety of command and staff assignments throughout his career. Previous assignments include: U.S. Army's 49th Deputy Chief Staff, G-1: Commanding General. Joint Readiness Training Center (JRTC) and Fort Polk: Deputy Commanding General for Sustainment, then later Operations, 25th Infantry Division; Director, Force 2025 and Beyond, US Army Capabilities and Integration Center (ARCIC), TRADOC; and Operations Officer (G3) for III Corps, Fort Hood, Texas. In that capacity, he deployed and served as the Deputy Director, Afghanistan National Security Forces (ANSF) Development, International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) Joint Command in Kabul, Afghanistan; Commander, 120th Infantry Brigade, First Army; Commander, 1st Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3d Brigade, 3d Infantry Division; Operations Officer (S3), 2d Battalion, 8th Infantry Regiment; and later as the Brigade Operations Officer (S3), 2d Brigade, 4th Infantry Division. Additionally, he served as the Aide-de-Camp to the III Corps Commanding General, Fort Hood, Texas; and Chief, Commander's Planning Group (CPG) and interim Executive Officer to the Commanding General, TRADOC. He has twice served at the National Training Center, Fort Irwin, California: first as a Company/Team and Battle Staff Observer/ Controller and later as a Senior Battalion and Brigade Combat Team Trainer. He served in multiple company grade positions at Fort Benning, Georgia, and has deployed to both Iraq and Afghanistan.

His awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal (with 1 Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster), Legion of Merit (with Silver Oak Leaf Cluster), Bronze Star Medal (with 1 Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster), Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal for Valor, Army Commendation Medal (with 4 Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters), Combat Infantryman Badge, and the Expert Infantryman Badge.

Lieutenant General Milford "Beags" Beagle, Jr. was commissioned as an Infantry Officer upon graduation from South Carolina State University in 1990 as a distinguished military graduate.

Lieutenant General Beagle holds master's degrees from Kansas State University, Manhattan, Kansas, and the United States Army School of Advanced Military Studies (SAMS), Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Lieutenant General Beagle has served in multiple leadership capacities from the platoon to division level. He has served in combat in both Iraq and Afghanistan in positions ranging from operations officer in tactical combat units to Advisor as part of NATO missions. His career assignments have spanned the globe from Hawaii to the Republic of South Korea.

His most recent assignments were as the Deputy Commanding General (Support), 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum, NY where he was forward deployed in support of Operation Inherent Resolve, Iraq. He then served as the 51st Commanding General of the United States Army Training Center and Fort Jackson, SC. He next served as the Commanding General, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry) and Fort Drum, NY. He currently serves as the Commanding General, Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth, KS.

Lieutenant General Beagle and his wife Pam have two children, Jordan (Spouse - Valencia) and Jayden.

Sergeant Major of the Army Michael R. Weimer

Sgt. Maj. of the Army Michael R. Weimer was sworn in as the 17th Sergeant Major of the Army on Aug. 4, 2023. Weimer's most recent assignment was serving as the Command Sergeant Major for U.S. Army Special Operations Command at Fort Liberty, North Carolina. Throughout his career he has served in a variety of positions from team member to Command Sergeant Major of Special Operations Joint Task Force Afghanistan, to Command Senior Enlisted Leader of U.S. Special Operations Command Central. As the Sergeant Major of the Army, Weimer is the Army chief of staff's personal adviser on matters affecting the enlisted force. He devotes the majority of his time traveling throughout the Army to observe training and interact with Soldiers and their Families. He sits on a variety of councils and boards that make



decisions affecting enlisted Soldiers and their Families and routinely invited to testify before Congress. Weimer is the public face of the U.S. Army's Noncommissioned Officer Corps, representing the NCO Corps to the American people in the media and through business and community engagements.

Weimer was a military child, calling multiple locations home throughout his youth, after which he enlisted in the Army in 1993. He successfully completed Special Forces Assessment and Selection in 1994. He graduated the Special Forces Weapons Sergeant Course and earned his Green Beret in 1996.

His previous assignments include tours with 7th Special Forces Group, and nearly 20 years in Special Mission Units. Weimer's military education includes all levels of the Noncommissioned Officer Education System, Sergeants Major Course, Executive Leader Course, Summit Course, Military Free-Fall Jumpmaster Course, Static Line Jumpmaster Course, Equal Opportunity Leaders Course, Survival, Evasion, Resistance and Escape (HIGH RISK), and Air Assault School. Weimer is a graduate of Norwich University receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in Strategic Studies and Defense Analysis.

His awards and decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal (2nd award) with Combat device (1st award), Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal with Valor (2nd award), Bronze Star Medal (5th award), Purple Heart (1st award), Defense Meritorious Service Medal (1st award), Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal with Valor, Joint Service Commendation Medal with "C" device, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Army Good Conduct Medal (8th award), National Defense Service Medal (2nd award), Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal (3rd award), Iraq Campaign Medal (3rd award), Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Noncommissioned Officer Professional Development Ribbon (5th award), NATO Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Special Forces Tab, Combat Infantry Badge, Military Freefall Jumpmaster Badge, and Air Assault Badge.




